Curate at St John's

Sharing God's Heart for East Asia

I serve as an Area Rep. with OMF East-UK, helping churches engage with God's mission among the peoples of East and Southeast Asia. My role is to connect churches, individuals, and mission opportunities so that more people can discover how God may be calling them to participate in His global mission.



Mobilising Churches for Mission A significant part of my work is visiting pastors, mission groups, and churches to share stories of what God is doing in Southeast Asia and how they can be involved. I love helping congregations see the bigger picture of God's mission and exploring how they can be involved through prayer, sending, or going. My heart is to see local churches actively participating in God's work both across the street and around the world.

Mission Discipleship I also help prepare people who are exploring mission service. I often walk alongside individuals for many months and years, as they discern their calling to short-term or longer-term mission. This preparation includes developing strong spiritual foundations and growing in cultural understanding for living and serving overseas. My aim is to equip people wisely to face cultures very much different from their own.

Supporting Missionaries on Furlough Mission doesn't stop when workers return home for a season. When missionaries come back on furlough, I help them reconnect with churches, family, and friends. This time allows space for rest, renewal, sharing stories of God's work, and preparing for the next season of ministry. Supporting missionaries well during furlough helps sustain long-term service overseas.

Championing the Arts in Mission Alongside my regional role, I serve as the Arts Champion for OMF. Throughout the history of overseas missions, creativity has been a powerful way to communicate truth across cultures. I am passionate about encouraging creative expressions of mission through storytelling, visual arts, music, drama, and digital media—helping communicate the message of Jesus in culturally meaningful ways.

**Working for A Rocha International
and based in Southall.**



Dave & Anne Bookless have lived in Southall since 1991 and been Mission Partners with the Church Mission Society (CMS), seconded to A Rocha, since 2001. Dave has written several books including *Planetwise – Dare to Care for God's World*

Dave is the Director of Theology for A Rocha International, which involves resourcing the worldwide church to understand the biblical call to care for creation. His wife Anne is rector of St Mary's, Norwood Green.

A Rocha is a global family of conservation organisations working together to live out God's calling to care for creation and equip others to do likewise.

Dave writes:

We held our three-yearly global leaders' forum in the Philippines last May. Although financial pressures meant the whole team and a couple of national A Rocha organisations couldn't be there, we had 70+ from 26 countries including several South East Asian Friends of A Rocha groups. It was a wonderful time of sharing, listening and decision-making, bathed in worship and prayer. Dave felt old(!), as he was one of only two who'd attended every forum since the first in the 1990s, and there were lots of young leaders and first-timers. Despite the carbon cost (which of course we offset through Climate Stewards), there's no substitute for the relationships built through quality time together. Highlights included welcoming two new national A Rochas, Singapore and Costa Rica, and some important family-wide discussions and decisions.

At the end of last year Dave spoke at three A Rocha conferences around India, helped to lead a track on creation care at the Micah Global Consultation in Cape Town, and coordinated a module on the biblical basis for creation care as the A Rocha Conservation Certificate, a part-time online one-year course, was launched.

There have also been exciting meetings with Scripture Union and the Bible Society, looking at global collaboration on creation care.

Dave plans to have his much delayed sabbatical in 2026.

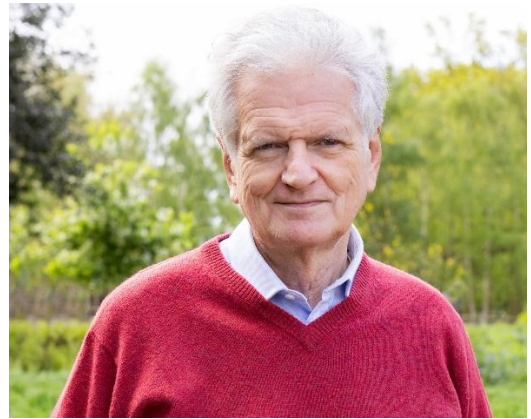
Praise for the launch of the ICETE Impact Team on Creation Care in Theological Education. Prayer for others to step into shared leadership, and for the global online survey to be effective.

Charles Cavenagh

Working in Tanzania



Charles Cavenagh has been a member of St John's since 1991.

Charles writes:

- *Since 2012 I've been working as a volunteer for the Anglican Church of Tanzania for several months each year. At present I go to Tanzania for about six weeks in January and February, and then again for about ten weeks from June until August. I work for three Diocese which are located in two areas – the Mara region in the north of Tanzania and the Katavi region in the west of Tanzania. The main work I do is to assist in village missions within these Diocese. Each mission lasts for five days, from Wednesday until Sunday. The missions are partly evangelistic and partly with a view to planting a new Anglican church in each village. At present I assist with about five village missions each year.*

Assisting in the village missions is my main work, but I also like to take an interest and give support in other areas of practical need within each Diocese.

I much appreciate the prayer support I receive from St John's.

Working in Brazil

Steve is a youth pastor at Comunidade da Vila Church in the heart of São Paulo, while studying for a Masters in Biblical Leadership at a local seminary and teaching English as a second language. He and his wife, Olivia, have lived in Brazil for three years.



Steve writes:

I am now approaching the end my masters course at the seminary here, and will finish in June of 2026. It has been a brilliant opportunity to understand the Brazilian church context, the nexus of faith and Brazilian culture and some of the particular challenges and opportunities of ministering in São Paulo, as well as a good chance to consolidate and deepen theological study!

At the same time, the pastor at our church who oversees youth and young-adult ministry moved on at the end of last year. In the past years I have been working primarily with the younger youth (11s-14s) to create and develop the ministry, and then stepped up to lead the weekly youth service and train the volunteers too. My new position at church has been confirmed, and I'm now responsible for the youth and student ministry - the latter of which doesn't yet exist, and so the next few months will involve plenty of moments to get to know the students and a good bit of trial and error to find out the times and places they are available.

One of the highlights of the past months has been our baptism and profession of faith classes (for those who were baptised as babies and want to reaffirm their faith). These have been precious moments of encouraging some of the youth, and seeing some of the fruit of our work in the past few years, and we are looking forward to some great baptism and profession of faith services in the next few months!

At the same time I have created a little business as an English teacher, which has grown to the point of being able to support most of our monthly living costs and give me enough time to focus as much as possible on the youth work, as the church is not able to contribute very much at the moment.

Prayer Points:

- **New responsibilities with youth and students**
- **Being able to teach and inspire the youth to invite friends and keep sharing their faith in schools, sports teams, in their families and generally beyond the walls of the church**
- **Practical and financial wisdom about balancing the demands of English teaching and church.**

Working for Crosslinks in Bangkok

They run a school for children in the Mahathai slums and the latest venture is a safehouse (My Father's House) for girls at risk in their local community.

In their newsletters the Robinsons write:

"We have so many things to be thankful for, even whilst facing the daily challenges of a ministry with children with such difficult lives.



At the end of last year we attended the Regional Student Convention for schools with the same accreditation in South East Asia. Schools from 6 countries attended, with over 900 student delegates, and we are the only charity school amongst them. After months of preparation of sports, Bible memory, science projects, artwork, drama performances, needlework, and music and singing, we travelled in our amazing new bus to the northern city of Chiang Mai for the week for the conference. We spent an exhausting week competing in all of these things, attending rally evenings with nightly opportunities for prayer, which our students readily went forward for. And then, on the final day, they did the overall awards, where awards are given for the best school in each category. We were completely shocked by receiving an award in all five categories despite how many schools attended, and nearly fell off our chairs when we received the top trophy in both sports and academic categories.

And then as they gave awards for the top 10 students out of the 900+ with the top overall scores from every category. Out of those top 10, 6 students were from the Place of Grace, including top trophy for best boy (Joel) and best girl (Esther). The other schools were asking us afterwards where we buy our coaches from to get these scores, and we said, no professional coaches, no professional lessons, they simply did their best for God's glory.

On 7 May new students will start with an intensive English programme and summer school starts in June."

Crosslinks - has twin priorities of front-line evangelism and the training of bible teachers in over 30 countries - the Robinsons in Thailand are our mission partners working in The Place of Grace.

John and Gillian Robinson set up the Place of Grace in 2011 in the middle of Bangkok's materially poor communities. This includes a school and more recently 'My Father's House' a safe house for vulnerable young girls.

They run children's and teenager's clubs throughout the week, providing a safe place for children to play, alongside learning about the God who loves them. They also run a foodbank where they pray for the people who come and tell them about God. John and Gillian have seen a number of teenagers become Christians and run a discipleship class for them.

Mission Aviation Fellowship (MAF) - uses planes to enable thousands of aid, relief and mission projects in really remote places - Stanley Dakin (a former vicar of St John’s) and wife, Judith, were on the Board of MAF and subsequently Judith worked for MAF

“Our vision is to see ‘isolated people physically and spiritually transformed in Christ’s

Imagine if your community had no roads and little access to the outside world. How would you or your family reach a doctor if you’re sick or injured? How can you receive an education or job opportunities? This is the reality for millions of people.

Jungles, mountains, swamps, insecurity and a dilapidated infrastructure are all barriers to receiving physical and spiritual care and a hope for the future.

Our pilots and personnel deliver relief workers, doctors, pastors, school books, food, medicines - everything that can only be safely and speedily delivered by air. With an MAF plane taking off or landing every four minutes, the need is huge. “

SOMA – Sharing of Ministries Abroad

“SOMA UK is an Anglican Mission Agency. It was birthed out of a move of God’s Spirit at the 1978 Lambeth Conference when Bishops from around the world came to the UK. Before it started 300 charismatic bishops and senior clergy took the opportunity to gather for a pre-conference renewal meeting. There was an outbreak of God’s Spirit that energised all those in the room. SOMA was born out of this experience of an outpouring of God’s grace. The Reverend Michael Harper became the founding Director in 1979.

Since then it has had a calling to ‘Join the Holy Spirit Tending to the Nervous System of the Body of Christ.’ In practice this has often meant going to places that are hurting (e.g. Rwanda in 1996), connecting the church internationally and building the body both overseas and in the sending country as well. Today SOMA continues to connect the church across the world.

The current ministry of SOMA UK builds on the work of our former National Director’s Stephen Dinsmore and Don Brewin who both have developed and grown SOMA UK’s vision birthed out from the 1978 Lambeth conference.”

Wellfound

Based in Greenford and previously supported by St James. The founder Howard Measham has spoken at St James.

“In 2005, Howard Measham witnessed the suffering and hardship faced by disadvantaged communities in Romania due to lack of clean water. This led him to place several of his own properties into a trust – the Measham Family Christian Foundation – solely to support relief work through the provision of clean water. Since then, WellFound has focussed its work in Africa, where the need is equally great. Rental income from the properties in trust now supports all administrative and operational costs in the UK, and also provides match-funding for work in Africa. This allows us to commit to donors that 100% of their money will go towards work in Africa with no deduction for administration or salaries in the UK.”

The Grove Community

"The Grove Community is a church plant in partnership with the Eden Network and the Church of England. In 2016, Mark and Laura Tate were sent by St Pauls Ealing in partnership with St Stephen's Ealing onto the Gurnell Grove estate.

The Tates moved onto the estate with a vision to see church form and grow where local residents could meet Jesus and be discipled. Since then they have seen the birth of various community initiatives including an after school Kids club, a Community lunch and an OAP club. A highlight of their work on the Grove is hosting Bingo Church - a monthly bingo night for residents which includes a short talk and opportunity for prayer."
